## Major Concepts:

of the course

1. Development in the preschool years is described from a whole child perspective which includes growth and change in each domain: emotional, social, spiritual, physical, cognitive, and language.

2. There are observable behaviours typical of three- and four-year-old development.

3. Each child is unique in his/her pattern and timing of growth and development, personality traits, interests, abilities, and experiences.

4. There is a reciprocal relationship between the child's growth and development and the environment. The child is influenced by the family and a complex network of societal and cultural factors.
